Delimitations

The research is predominantly centered on Pashto-speaking areas of Afghanistan and limited in Pakistan. The Pashto speaking people living beyond these limits are not taken into account. It could be that it might only have a small sample size because of logistical limitations. Despite attempts to record different accents, differences among some smaller groups are not completely recorded. Language change proceeds and it only observe some of the phonological features at a given point in time. Past changes or temporary changes are sometimes not considered. While it do cover sociolinguistics, other aspects regarding cultural basis for accents (historical events, patterns of migration, social structure) could also be interesting.

Literature Review

Phonological variation in Pashto has been an area of interest among linguists, dialectologists, and sociolinguists, especially consonant systems, dialectal diversity and structural patterns. The rich literature offers both descriptive and analytic perspectives, but systematic comparative research on regional phonological variation is limited. The study review here the most relevant contributions to the current work.

Some early work on Pashto standardization was done by D. N. Mackenzie in his book A

Standard Pashto (1990) in which he described original spelling that conveyed more of pronunciation than existing systems. Mackenzie's work is still relevant for analyzing structural norms across which phonological variation in the region may occur. But his interests were predominantly prescriptive, not variationist.

Also, Yousef (1995) and Habibullah Tegey and Barbara Robson in A Reference Grammar of Pashto with Phonology characteristics such as vowel corresponding systems, consonant cluster and the accent used for spectral estimates. Although they cover the structural phonology of Pashto, however, no time is given to a detailed description of regional phonetic variation.

Phonological structure has been explored in greater detail by M. K. Khan (1999) on Syllable Structure and Word Order in Pashto, through scrutiny of the interfacing of syllable patterns and syntactic constituency. This study demonstrates the systematic nature of Pashto phonology and it offers theoretical motivation for investigating syllable structure differences between dialects.

Pashto's acoustic and phonetic features are discussed in The Phonetics of Pashto by Herbert Penzl (2003) which includes charts giving spectral data on the fricatives and affricates of Pashto, among other things. Dialect diversity and sociolinguistic variation were covered more directly in the Sociolinguistic Survey of Northern Pakistan (David G. Hallberg) and Patterns of Sounds in Pashto (Calvin Rängken Rensch, Sandra J. Decker & David G. Hallberg). Their results highlight substantial individual variation, but are concerned mostly with descriptive survey technique rather than acoustic detail.

Lexical records, including Amid Dictionary by Hassan Amid, contain lexicographic resources that have an indirect reflection of phonological diversity through the variant forms and pronunciation patterns. Though not a

phonological study, it contributes to dialect comparison via word lists.

The technical report Language Specific Peculiarities Document for Pashto as Spoken in Pakistan and Afghanistan by Appen Butler Hill (2015) covers phonetic and pronunciation differences that are of interest for language technology and speech processing. This case study highlights the potential repercussions of phonological variation in the modern world.

Recent studies including work by N. Khan, S. Ullah and N. U. Rahim (2023) and Phonemic Inventory of Pashto by S. Khan deal with phoneme inventory and sound inventories. These studies offer updated lists of vowel and consonant systems, but there still is a need to compare the variety with others further away and in sociophonetic perspectives.

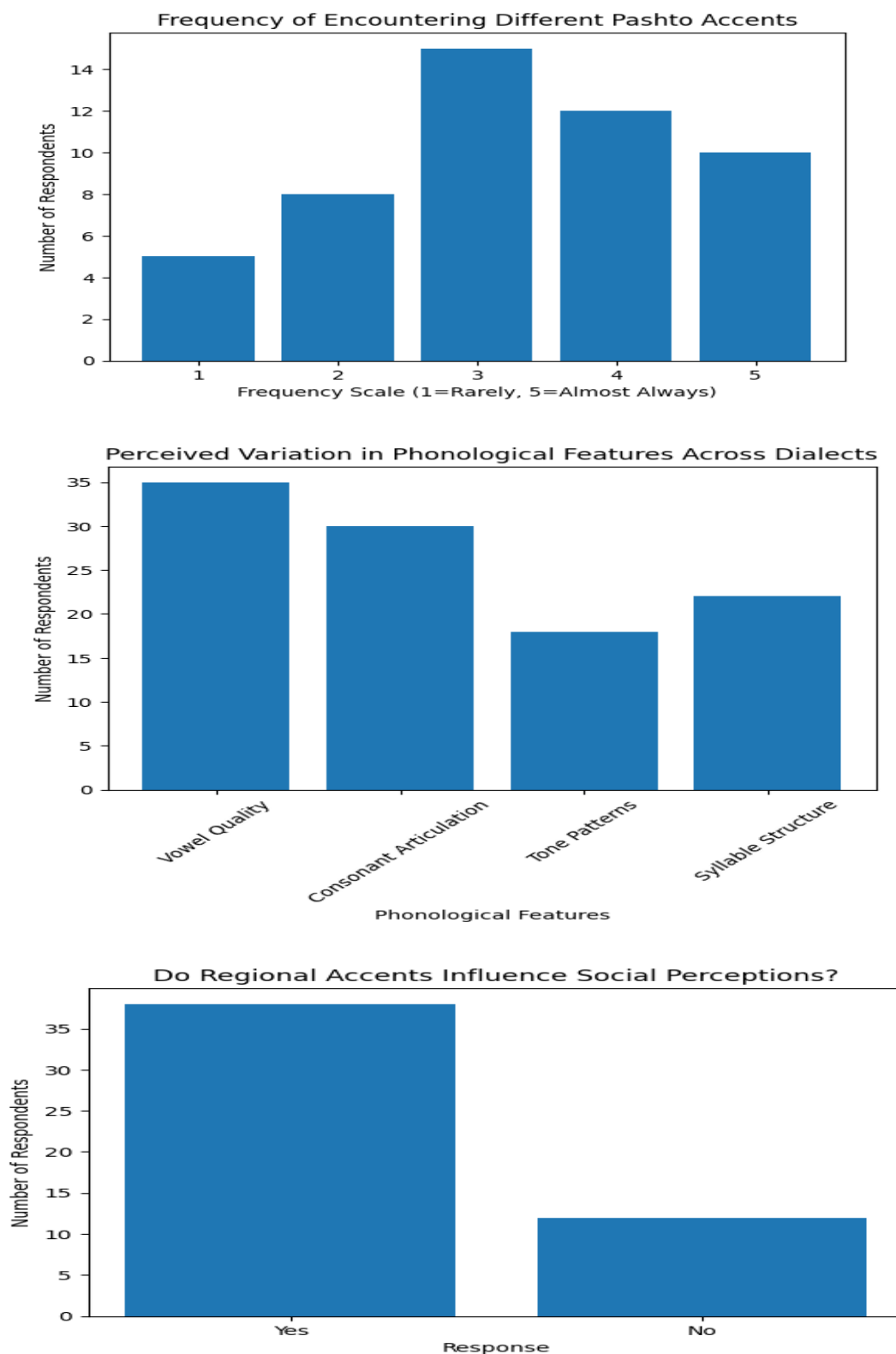
Theoretical Framework

Limitation of the study

A broader study involving these

The sample size and geographic distribution of the study participants may limit the external validity of its findings.
